

Medical training for mountain professionals

Prerequisite:

This training is open to mountain professionals (mountain guides)

By who:

The courses are taught by:

- Owen Samuel (Mountain Guide, Paramedic, Paramedic)
- Pierre Muller (Doctor and mountain guide)

Objectives:

- Gain confidence to deal with complex situations.
- To become a reliable link in the chain of survival.
- Understand the limits and priorities that the mountain environment dictates to first responders. Refresh the understanding of the principles of first aid priorities.
- Refresh the understanding of common pathologies, anatomy and physiology.

Content of the training:

- Rescue and evacuation actions effective in the field.
- Technical problems in the field, with and without rope, with first aid adapted to these environments and accidents.
- Anatomy and Physiology (Respiratory, Cardiovascular, Neurological, Musculoskeletal)
- Pharmacology (global overview)

Teaching resources:

- 1/3.(6-8 hours of online learning and assessment that will cover medical issues, anatomy, physiology, and pharmacology taking place in the month prior to the course)
- Theoretical courses in the classroom 1/3.
- Practical workshops in the mountains: medical scenarios dealing with difficult terrain and incident management 1/3

Price:

- 200 €/day or 600 € for 24 hours of lessons given over 3 days.

Duration of the training:

- One day of e-learning to be completed during the month before the start of the training
- One day of theoretical classes in the classroom
- One day practical workshops in the mountains

TOTAL: **3 days of 8 hours or 24 hours of training.**

Access terms and deadlines:

- To be a mountain guide.

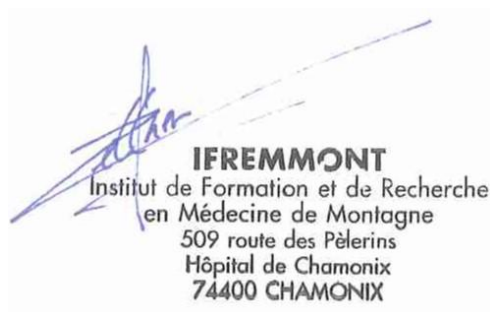
Achievement of objectives:
